Following her heart comes at a cost, yet her journey becomes a celebration of resilience, joy, and the discovery that reality can far surpass dreams.

Discussion Questions

- Jayne spends much of her life putting others first. How does this shape her character, and what finally pushes her to choose differently?
- The cities Jayne visits feel so vivid that setting becomes a character in itself, comforting, challenging, and transforming her. How do these places shape Jayne's journey and what do they reveal about who she becomes?
- Chocolate is a recurring motif. What do you think it symbolizes about savoring life, relationships, and joy?
- How does Jayne influence Mason, and what does their relationship suggest about the power of love to awaken hope?
- Elizabeth Barrett and Robert Browning are often seen as the literary standard for soulmates. How does Jayne and Mason's relationship echo or differ from theirs, and what does this reveal about idealized versus lived love?
- Jayne and Mason connect deeply, even knowing their time together is limited. What makes their love believable and moving?
- The novel highlights the tension between waiting for the "right time" and realizing time is limited. How did this theme resonate with you?
- Jayne's choice to stay with Mason costs her the relationship with her son. How did you respond to her decision, and what do you think it reveals about her?
- Jayne leaves behind journals for her daughter. What do these journals suggest about what she hopes her legacy to be?
- At the end, Jayne seeks solace in the church. Do you see this as her way of finding forgiveness, a new beginning, or both?

Fun Extras

Chocolate Tasting with Stories

Pair different chocolates (dark, milk, filled) and invite members to share a memory connected with chocolate—whether joyful, comforting, or bittersweet.

Travel Map Activity

Print a simple map of Europe. Ask members to mark places they have visited or dream of visiting, then share a time when stepping outside of routine changed their perspective—just as it did for Jayne.

Choice and Consequence Bowl

Write down choices that had long-term consequences. Draw and discuss how decisions can alter the course of a life, much like Jayne's choice to stay with Mason.

Moments of Grace

Invite each member to name a time they experienced forgiveness or reconciliation. This links back to Jayne's final visit to the church.

Legacy Playlist

Create a shared playlist of songs about love, change, and resilience. Keep it joyful but meaningful—something the group can revisit as a reminder of the story.

- What inspired you to write *Love is All*?
- Why do you think setting plays such an important role in your stories?
- Why did you choose chocolate as a recurring motif?
- Which scene was your favorite to write? Which was the hardest?
- What do you hope readers carry with them after finishing the novel?
- If Jayne could leave readers with one piece of advice, what would it be?
